*From the Pastor's Desk:*

My prayer for each of you is that your summer is a time of rest and enjoyment. Refreshment we don't otherwise get to enjoy during other times of the year, especially during the snow filled months. Picnics, family reunions, pool parties, camping trips and just getting away, just to name a few. From this I hear about many of your adventures, both small and big, and it gives me great joy to know that you are seizing the beauty God has given us through His beautiful creation.

I've heard over the past 3 years this comment "I missed Church because of a family reunion" or because "we were out in the middle of nowhere and couldn't get to Church." And the reply I normally give isn't received as well as I have hoped. It is this, "was it a last minute reunion or camping trip?" The answer is always "no, we had planned it months in advance." To which my reply is "then why didn't you plan and do research on where the closest Church was?" To which I get a blank stare.

Our first reading from Jeremiah sums up the responsibility I and all pastors are gifted with. "Woe to the shepherds who mislead and scatter the flock of my pasture, says the Lord. ...You have not cared for them, but I will take care to punish your evil deeds." I read that and I think how the heck am I supposed to make it to heaven, the punishment I will surely incur is not going to be heaven. Then I realize I can only express the teachings of the Church, through what I have done and taught (Gospel of Mark), and one's own free will is what we are accountable for.

My friends, as we journey through life, we have to be accountable for our own actions, words, and decisions. Choosing wisely means planning, prioritizing, and following through. It also means that we take our faith seriously, and in many cases make sacrifices for that faith. Mass is the closest thing on earth that gives us a glimpse of what heaven is like. I hope I am a reflection of the joy that Mass allows us to participate in. That is my goal, and frankly why I became a priest. It is not just a formatted hour long monologue. It is structured carefully to allow one to be absorbed into it. For example:

The introductory rite is the greeting and response, a back and forth of unity between the priest (persona Christi) and the faithful. Then our readings set the tone of God's message, centering on the life of Jesus and the message of his ministry. The Eucharist is the summit of our faith, and again by participating in the prayers we unite ourselves to God through those prayers. Next is the communion rite, beginning with the Our Father. It is at this point that I take a small piece of the Precious Body and drop him into the Precious Blood. My silent words at this point are "May this mingling of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it." After communion the concluding rite takes place. The prayer after communion is read and the dismissal is given.


Why am I going on about this, you all know the order of Mass. Well, I think sometimes we forget that Mass in it's entirety is God pouring his love down on us, and our reply to that is sometimes, it's just another Mass.

May each of us never take for granted what Jesus has given us. Himself, each and every time Mass is celebrated!


